Principal's Forum	Mr. Litwin	10 min	College and Career Pathways  We showcased a video of students expressing their desired careers for the future.  The counseling program is designed to answer key questions, such as:  How can we intentionally engage historically underserved families in meaningful, reciprocal, and mutually beneficial ways?  Students begin discussing career and college pathways with counselors as early as kindergarten, with formal meetings occurring in 5th grade.  Family Engagement  There are many ways for families to get involved:

 Volunteering in classrooms or on field trips. We recognize that many potential volunteers may not be visible, and we want to ensure everyone feels valued and included. Notably, 60% of our families are white; we should reflect on who is attending events and consider inviting those who might not be present. Approximately 25% of families have limited economic resources. We discussed the importance of inclusivity and how our community can ensure everyone feels valued. **Leadership Opportunities for Families** • Principals have been tasked with creating leadership opportunities for families: o The leadership team meets Thursdays from 2:15 to 3:15 PM (not every Thursday, dates will be shared in perspectives) • We are seeking three family representatives to participate in this process. o An example of policy work from this committee could include refining the cell phone use policy and family input on school events and assemblies. We would love to have representation from the school community. o Video call capabilities will be available, though in-person attendance is preferred. **Questions from the Group** • Question: Why are schools engaging in this initiative? o **Response**: This is part of ongoing legislative efforts. Additionally, We want to make sure we're reaching out to the broader community to be sure educational experiences, instructional design, school activities serve the families we have now. Question: Will there be an application process if more than three families are interested? o Current Focus: We are primarily looking for feedback at this **Suggestion**: Ensure that perspectives include representation from all grade levels.

Field Update     The PTA has set aside some surplus funds (around \$20,000) to support redoing the field. This project has been delayed because of constraints on the district side, so the timeline is unclear.  Directory
			Bethany reported that the Read-A-Thon is scheduled for November. The theme this year is "Camp Read-a-Lot!"  Plans include bringing in a naturalist from Dodge Nature Center and a representative from the Raptor Center for a kickoff event. #### Field update

We wanted to provide an update on the progress of the field upgrade project:

- Staff Changes: Our main contact and advocate, the Executive Director of Facilities, has recently left the school district. While this is a
  significant change, we are continuing to move forward with school district support. We have recently been assigned a district facilities
  planner who will work with us to gather more detailed information about our specific needs. Principal Litwin has had an initial meeting with
  the planner.
- Scope of Work: Field (regrading/soil improvements, irrigation and new grass)- After a school district review, it was determined that the needs for our field are similar to another school's, and both projects are larger than originally anticipated. As a result, the field upgrade will likely be handled through the district's capital maintenance process. We are awaiting more information on what this process looks like.
- Rain gardens: Corrie Layfield met with representatives from the Capitol Region Watershed District to explore the potential to incorporate rain gardens in the project. The watershed district may be able to provide designs and partial funding for rain gardens depending on a few factors.
- Trees: Parents also expressed interest in planting trees to provide shade and reduce the field area that needs to be maintained. We will explore this portion of the project more once we have better information about the path of the field upgrade.
- Next Steps: Field- Principal Litwin has a second meeting scheduled with the facilities planner to get more details in place then will meet with the field committee to discuss some proposals.
- Rain gardens- We are working to get the watershed district information they need to inform rain garden design and funding potential. Then they will provide designs and information on funding opportunities.
