<ul> <li>Discussion of referendum for school funding. Public school employees are not allowed to advocate for one side or another. Principal Litwin is presenting information on both sides of the referendum. Principal Litwin showed these slides.</li> <li>The district's ability to provide challenging, engaging programs and enrichment for its 33,000+ students is dependent on our funding.</li> <li>The school district is asking for an operating levy, which funds essential things like staff and operations. General fund money (tied to student enrollment) largely goes to Special Education, English language learning, and other services. The state and federal government have never fully funded those obligations.</li> <li>SPPS had to cut \$37 million last year. At Horace Mann, we lost our reading support teacher. If the voters don't pass the referendum, we will face \$37 million in cuts next year, which would probably mean cutting music and TAs. The district could also have to make cuts to transportation funding, for example increasing the area around the school where bussing is not offered.</li> <li>To maintain quality, we need to maintain staff and minimize turnover. Continuous funding helps us do that. Schools with needier students tend to have younger teachers and would likely be more seriously affected by teacher layoffs.</li> <li>Part of the reason the district is increasingly short on funding is because the per pupil allowance did not increase with inflation from 2003 to 2024. If the allowance were adjusted for inflation, the district would have almost \$50 million more annually to match the per-pupil amounts we had in 2003.</li> </ul>	Principal Litwin	15 min

•	SPPS did a survey and found strong support for public education among St Paul residents, which led them to propose the operating levy. This survey was done before the city and county decided to raise taxes.		
•	Comparing the funding that SPPS seeks per pupil through the levy to what other metro area districts are seeking through their own referenda, SPPS's request is the second lowest of 11 districts (see slide 8 in the presentation linked above).		
•	The levy would increase funding per student by \$1,073 per year, generating \$37M for next year. The levy extends 10 years with adjustments for inflation. There's a website you can go to and calculate what it would mean for you ( <a href="mailto:spps.org/referendum">spps.org/referendum</a> , then scroll down to "calculate your tax impact").		
•	SPPS spend more per child and less on administration than the average district. SPPS has a strong rating, which allows it access to lower interest rates.		
•	Here at Horace Mann, we try to focus on implementing best practices. For example, we're doing a lot with phonics while building in comprehension and the love of reading. Having stable staff allows you to do those sorts of things.

	476, about 40 more than is typical). This is a testament to the

	New headphones. The new iPads require headphones to have a USB. C connection, which is why we included these

	students did not bring new headphones to school. It cost

the school \$3k to buy them for students who needed them. We expect this to be an ongoing expense as headphones break. This is an expense the PTA could consider supporting.  School phone system: we have a new system and it's been a rocky start. We still do not have a good way to get messages to teachers with voice mail. Judy is working on this and helping with messages in the meantime.  School garden and landscaping: the new garden is gorgeous, providing flowers throughout the building. On the east side of the school, we lost our big oak tree, which has meant that the temperature in the building has soared.  Mr. Litwin's office / cart: SPPS has had a big increase in special ed students (500-600 new kids). Horace Mann went from 8% to 12% kids with special education needs, so we have more special education educators. Principal Litwin gave away his room to be a staff lounge and conference room. He now sits next to Judy and works around the school from a rolling cart.  Behavior and Discipline – no items  Family Feedback – no items

<ul> <li>The school board voted to put this before voters. Our board has already made tough financial decisions to be good stewards of our money. The board has already cut down to the bon.</li> <li>Further cuts would be devastating, as schools would have to consider cutting anything not contractually obligated, including Pre-K, high school sports.</li> <li>Some of the reasons why the school districts are low on funding include: Cuts to Title 1 and Special Education funding from the federal government, with some schools being more affected than others. Additionally in 2003, Governor Tim Pawlenty changed the funding approach such that school funding would not be tied to inflation. As inflation has increased, real resources available to schools have gone down.</li> </ul>	Campaigny

• Teresa: St Paul historically has not passed these [referenda] as readily as Minneapolis. Minneapolis passes 70-80% of them even without campaigning. Last time a similar referendum passed, it passed with 60%. We are close to not passing because it must pass at 50%. In terms of turnout, this ward, wards 3 and 4 have the highest turnout.  Question from a parent: What will be the tax increase?

<ul> <li>Treasurer's Report and Approval of the 2025-26 Budget</li> <li>Overview: Horace Mann PTA is a 501c3 non-profit. Every year we raise money for various initiatives. Our biggest fundraising events are the silent auction (spring) and read-a-thon coming up next month. Other sources are the plant sale, membership dues, and employer matches. It funds raised support students and our programs.</li> <li>Status: We have a well-funded, highly engaged PTA. We always start with the treasurer's report. As of a couple days ago we had \$126k available. If you look at the 2nd page of the budget, it accounts for spending \$115k of that. So now, on day 1, we have some donations and we're in the fortunate position that we have a lot of priorities paid for.</li> <li>Treasurer's report: The left-hand side shows how the PTA did last year, showing expenses and buckets we allocated funding to. On the right-hand side is the budget for this year, which we developed last year. This budget shows our fundraising goals and planned spending.</li> <li>Funding goals: We tend to estimate funding goals conservatively because we don't want to pressure our volunteers. Last year, we budgeted \$101k in fundraising goals; this year we are budgeting about the same.</li> <li>Carnival: We used to ask for sponsorships for the carnival, but this year the PTA will fund it. This is because we fear sponsorship exhaustion going back to our sponsors so soon after the auction.</li> <li>Plant sale: We took in about \$6k in revenue last year, with net impact for the PTA of about \$1,000.</li> <li>Funds to support fundraising: These items are unchanged with the exception of the plant sale. We added a line item for Eagle Bluff (a camp 5th graders go to in the spring). The Boo Bash is a fund-raiser for Eagle Bluff, which costs about \$420 per student. student. PTA provides pizza for Boo Bash, which the Boo Bash committee then sells and keeps all the revenue for Eagle Bluff.  • Field: The PTA had \$15k earmarked for the field improvement project, including for for regrading and revitalizing the field. The district is taking this on now with its own funds.  • Field trips: Our biggest spending is on field trips. The PTA pays for things like buses with a budget per student. We have allocated more per student to field trips recently because of rising costs.  • Art Adventure. We had Art Adventure last year, but bussing costs may not have been captured in that line item.  • Classroom materials: PTA gives each teacher \$1000/year for anything they need for the classroom.  • Band: PTA pays for the band residency. We paid for instrument repair last year and we'll continue to cover \$1500/year for instrument repair.  • Other: We've added funding for a few other things like family fun nights. The PTA funded the building of the new garden by the cafeteria entrance and will cover costs for its upkeep.  Comment from Alex:  • We do a parent survey every 2 years, which provides input we use to think about how to prioritize funding. If you have feedback, reach out to Sam (treasurer@hms-pta.org).  Comment from parent:  • She is the executive director of Give to the Max and is offering support. Horace Mann just signed up to fundraise on Give to the Match.
