<p>Principal's Forum</p> <p>Test scores</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Reading and math: Last year, HMS had 70% students proficient in reading and math. This is highest or second highest in the district and in the top half for the state. We are still hoping that with phonics instruction we can get into the mid or upper 80s. Math: 90% of kids were at or above grade level for math. We want to maintain that. Science: they redid the test this year, so scores dropped but it's a different metric, so not comparable. We were second highest in the city. Goals for the year: a frustration is that the state measures are so delayed that it's really hard to use the information for any instructional change. I wrote our goals this year to fit with the measures we're doing throughout the year so we can change trajectories for kids. We want to get to 87 and 88% of kids doing well in the FAST test Sept Jan and May. That would be a 12% increase from fall and winter. <p>Enrollment</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> This school year we have 468 students enrolled, our highest in Mr. Litwin's tenure (maybe ever). When people enrolled, we asked why students came in, "the word on the street is that it's a good school." <p>Behavior</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Last year, we had more than 340 kids who never saw Ms. Cole or Mr. Litwin for behavior concerns, so those students' behavior was all managed in the classroom. We had more than 1,300 good news calls made last year for student behavior. We had a 6.5:1 ratio of good news calls to behavior referrals. Behavior is very strong overall, but our students who are Black or African American are more than 2 times as likely to be referred for behavior. There is a lot of self-reflection and thought about how teachers approach things, and reflection on how we see kids in the classroom. We're doing work to be sure we're providing the front-end support needed for all kids to be successful. 	<p>Principal Litwin</p>	<p>15 min</p>

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<p><i>Core beliefs around behavior</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All kids are all our kids. Every staff member is responsible for supporting all kids, not just their class. • We believe that behavior is communication. If a student struggles to follow expectations, they may have lagging skills, and/or need support for emotional regulation. We may need direct instruction to support those students. • We want to develop the feeling that we support each other. Classmates support one another too. If you have a classmate with a temper tantrum, teachers can help classmates understand what's happening. • As students get older, we help them understand that some students have learning differences and may be on the autism spectrum. We want students to realize that we all have things we're working on, and none of us are good at everything. <p><i>Our behavior approach</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We work hard to build expectations and build relationships. We hold ourselves and kids accountable for our choices. We repeat these things, over and over. • The best way to help kids is to help them know what to do when they're not successful. • Schoolwide expectations include how to be safe, respectful, and responsible. • We focus on things that are within students' control. E.g. once a student arrives at school, if they're late, we encourage the student to move "with purpose" to class. • Classroom interventions include: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ De-escalation, humor, active supervision ○ Problem-solving meeting with student ○ Parent contact ○ Formal intervention with or without assistance of the student assistance team (SAT) • Sometimes we have to look at special education or a 504 plan. <p><i>English language learning (ELL)</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We want to support students learning English. We want to have clear expectations and that language instruction includes vocab in addition to concepts. Making sure we have diff scaffolds in place, like visuals in the classroom to support those students. • One of our greatest strengths is that so many of the students speak English. Students learning the language are totally immersed. We want students to have lots of opportunities to practice speaking. • 7-8% of Horace Mann students are English language learners. It's 40% at the district level. • I asked our EL teacher Regina Sheering what families might not be able to access school communications in English. The 2 main languages needing translation were Tigrinya and Spanish. <p><i>Personal devices</i></p>		

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<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The policy is that they can have devices but they have to be quiet. It's kind of "don't ask don't tell." The device should be in school mode where they can't access anything or off. We ask families to keep their devices at home, but some families are adamant that their child have devices because they are latchkey kids or go to child care after school and we don't resist in those cases. This is going well. We expected more pushback, but families are very supportive. We offer individual reminders and redirections if students have devices. Last year there were a lot of calls and texts during lessons, but we've seen very little this year (just 1 referral). Password management: 5th graders do have their own passwords, but it's generated by the district. This is to get into iPads. Many apps are on Clever. The students have been responsible with technology, sticking with only what we ask them to use. A federal regulation requires us to teach about cyberbullying and online safety. 		
<p>Treasurer's Report and Approval of the 2025-26 Budget</p> <p>Income</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Income is shifting because we're in the middle of Readathon and Give to the Max. We changed our donation platform to GiveBetter. Next meeting we'll have a more complete update on progress there. <p>Expenses</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Expenses are on track with our budget so far. <p>Other updates</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> PEX is a new prepaid debit card program we rolled out to teachers. Now, instead of submitting a handwritten form with a receipt and getting a check, teachers who have opted in can use a debit card and access PTA funds immediately. We had to move money to the PEX platform. We'll report on this every meeting. We filed our tax return today and we owe \$0 as a non-profit. We got a quote from LifeTouch, the yearbook provider. The quote came in the same as last year, but that's higher than the previous year. We failed to update the budget line item for yearbook, but this is not a change from last year. Otherwise, we would have to cut pages or shift to black and white. Classroom residency with Heart of the Beast proposed for the entire school, every grade, costing \$7,125. The board previously decided to support it. The expense falls within our budget for residencies. Ms. Commers is leading it. The residency can include "buddy circles," smaller groups of students doing more focused work. There are buddy circle options for another \$1k or \$2k. We agree to approve the buddy circles. Authorizing this expense does not preclude us from supporting future residencies. 	Sam (PTA treasurer)	10 min
<p>Teacher updates</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> We just wrapped up parent-teacher conferences with close to 100% participation. We're looking forward to the Read-a-Thon challenge at the end. Some classrooms are doing their own reading challenges. Reading buddies have begun. 	Teacher reps: Mr. Lindskoog and Ms. Kortuem	5 min

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<ul style="list-style-type: none"> College-bound kindergarten deposit day. It's coming up this month. St Paul is starting this with this year's kindergarteners. There will be a presentation with a counselor about how to save for a toy and then they can symbolically add to the account. 		
<p>PTA School Supply Proposal</p> <p><i>Background on the proposal</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Stacey Tsantir and Solena Fleming have proposed a pilot program in which the PTA would purchase all school supplies for the following year with parents paying (and PTA covering any gap). The PTA committee would buy upfront in cooperation with teachers. Goals are reduced waste, equity among students, and a general net benefit. We need to see if there's community support. Community feedback: We have received 64 responses so far—a very high response rate for a PTA survey <ul style="list-style-type: none"> There is no deadline for the feedback It's just a pilot, so if it doesn't go well, we don't have to keep it We had questions about price We want to be cost-sensitive and be sure families don't pay more than last year. Families report having paid \$20-\$50 per child. <i>What families like about the proposal:</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Saving time Recycling Equity (all kids have same supplies) Less waste Better process for teachers 1 person doesn't support the proposal. <i>What families <u>don't</u> like about the proposal:</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Main one - missing out on the fun of shopping for school supplies Concerns about cost Preferring to buy environmentally friendly things <i>Overall:</i> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Very supportive! The need could be school supplies so there would be something people would donate for specifically (depending on what happens with the proposal). The donations would go toward a reserve fund. The theme for the auction will be "spy."
